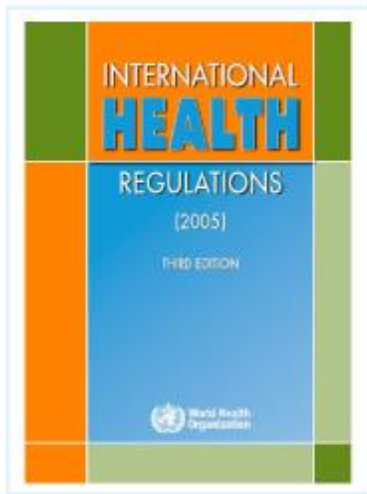
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International Health Regulation (IHR) (2005)



Adopted on
23rd May 2005

Entered into force
on 15th June 2007

Key principles of the IHR regulations

IHR 2005 is a legally binding treaty of 196 state parties.



States must prepare, report and coordinate.

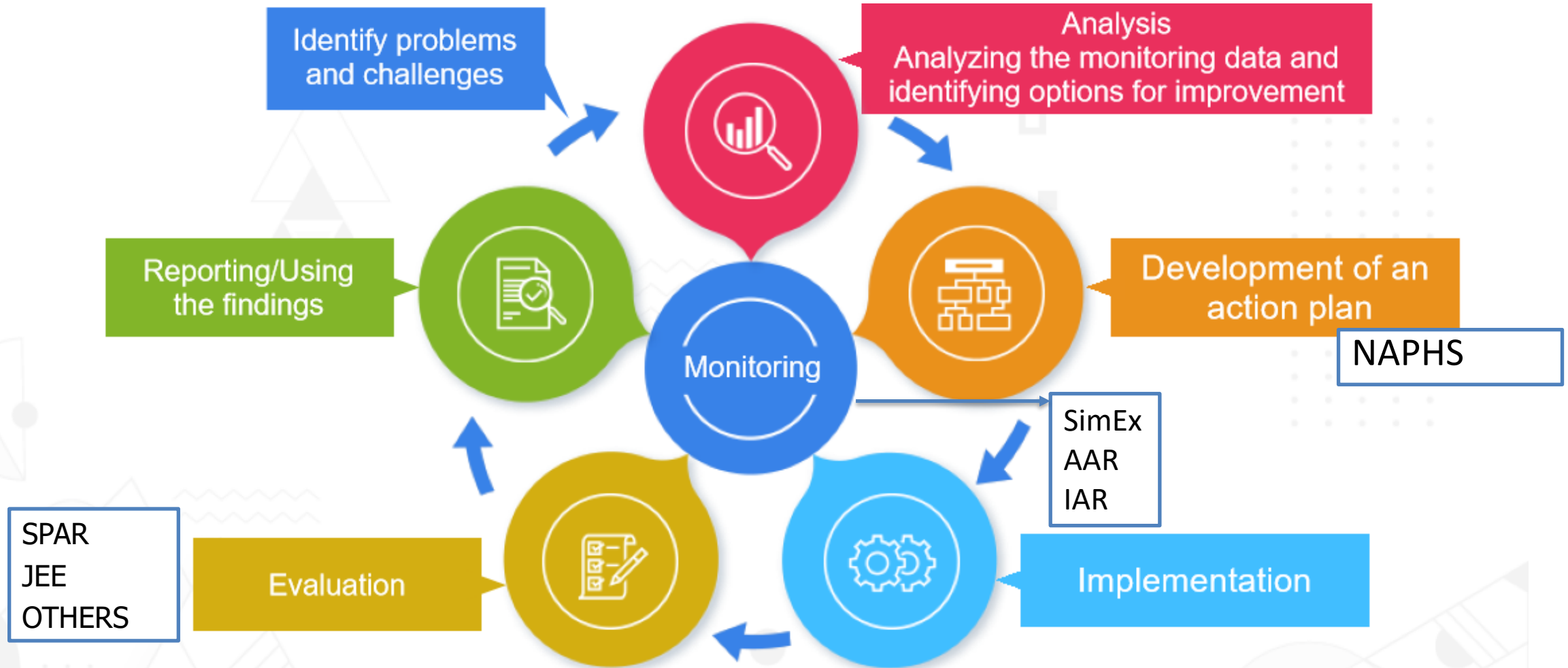

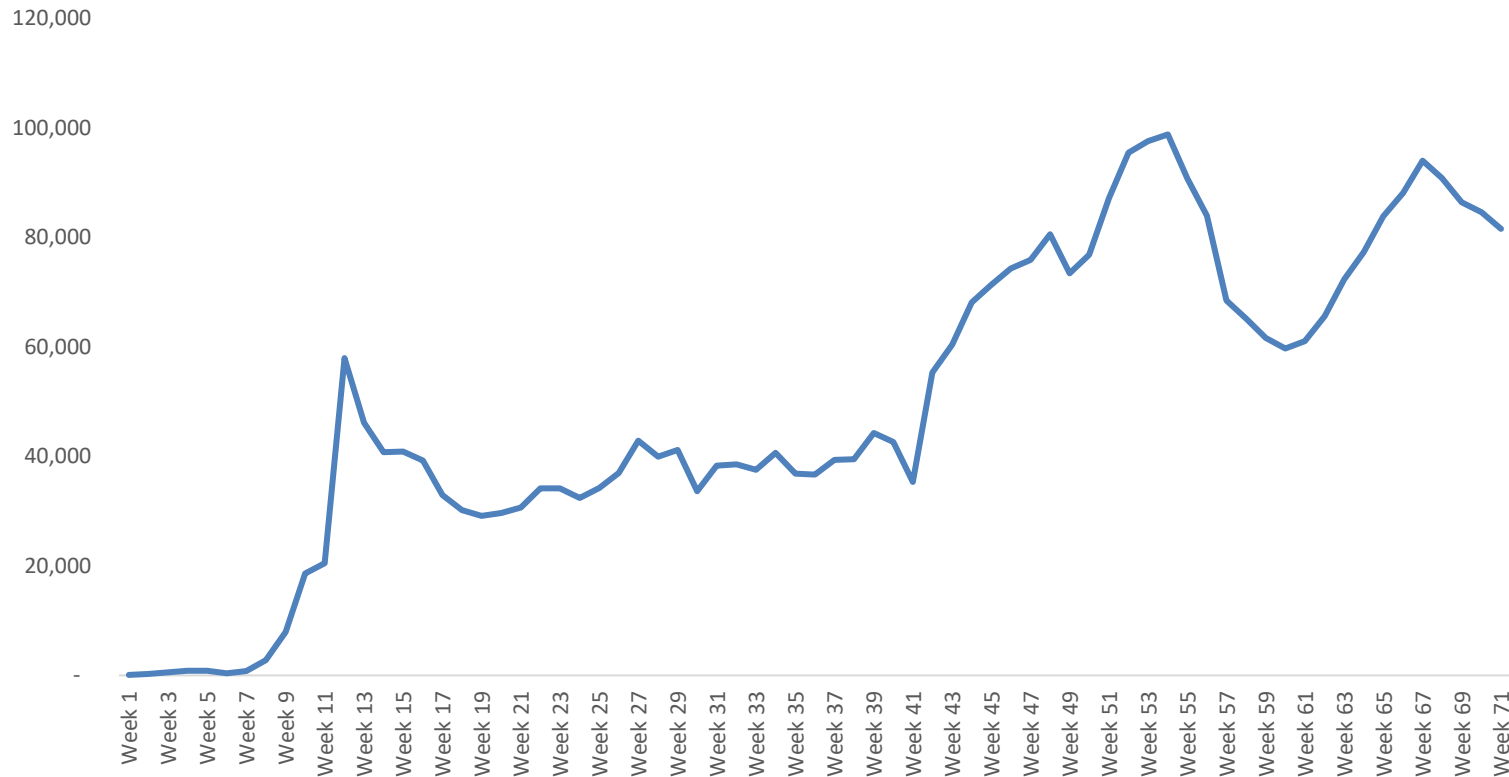
In-person IHR M&E training

- Between **2017** and **2019**, the HSP department developed an initial course on introduction to M&E for IHR
- It was a **five-day** course provided at the country level
- Almost 100 participants had taken the course by the time COVID-19 started
- TOT training was also in the pipeline to cascade the course to more Member States
- Due to competing priorities, TOTs were not readily available



Challenges posed by COVID-19

Weekly COVID-19 deaths



- Country capacity to respond to emergencies was tested
- The association of IHR capacities as measure by evaluation tools and the outcome measure of COVID was found to be not strong
- Travel restrictions mean that the rollout of the in-person IHR M&E training was not possible any longer

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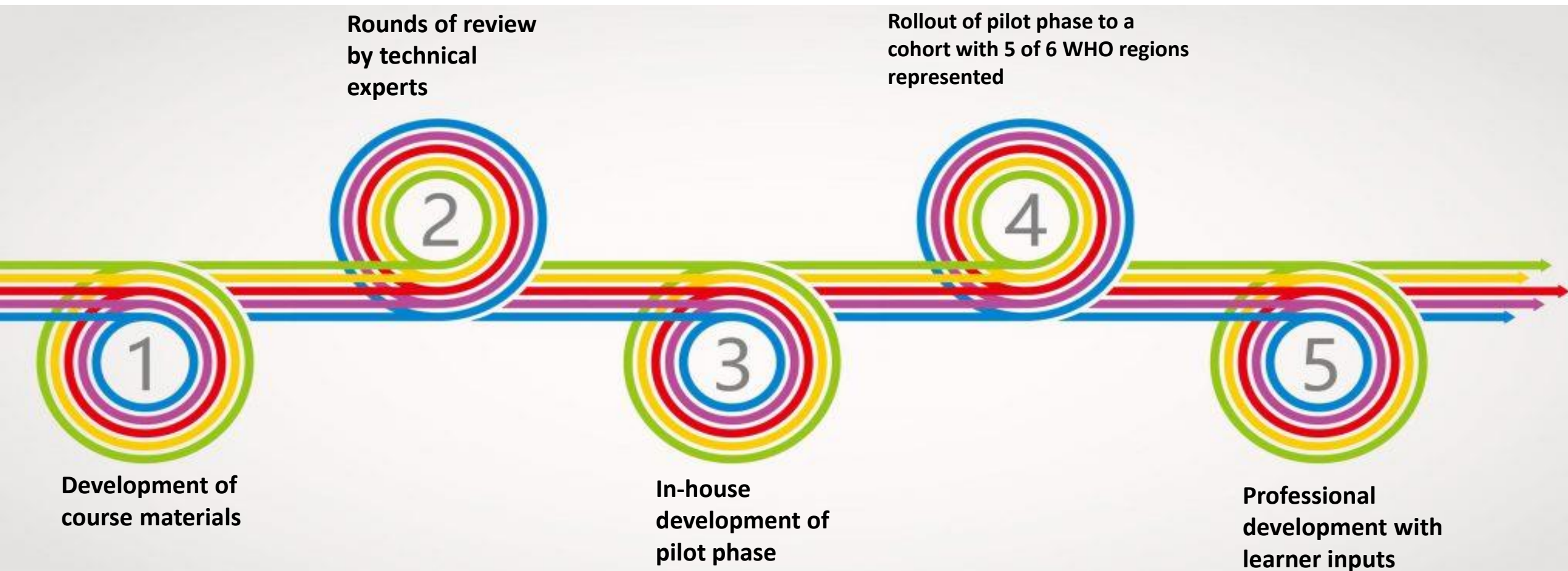


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Adapting the IHR course into e-learning



Piloting IHR M&E Online Course

Course piloting

- Materials from the face-to-face training were updated and new content added
- Technical experts withing HSP department reviewed and revised the materials
- In 2020/2021, materials were used to convert course to online and version 1 was piloted with a few trainees (5 regions represented)
- Pilot: Participants from 5 regions over 2 weeks
- Week 1: Self learning: Course modules: 1, 2, 3, 4
- Week 2: Webinars: With participants working in plenary and groups on provided situation provides case studies

Self-learning modules

IHR Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) pilot training

Objectives
In the evolving context where new public health events arise and constitute threats to public health, and also the ongoing COVID-19 challenges, this pilot training on IHR Monitoring and Evaluation aims at reinforcing the capacity and skills of target audience and member states to carry out monitoring and evaluation activities related to IHR implementation. Besides, the Member States will be able to organize, run and evaluate training tailored to their specific needs, and thus respond more efficiently to public health events.



Introduction to IHR monitoring and evaluation








The IHR Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) online course aims to build the M&E planning capacities necessary to monitor the implementation of IHR among Member States. This four-module course imparts M&E competencies and covers M&E frameworks skills to carry out assessments objectively, set-up robust M&E systems and effectively implement M&E information in decision making. The course includes case studies and role plays that are designed around evaluations, prioritization of actions, and resource advocacy to finance pandemic preparedness plans.

Course objectives:

Upon completion of this course, the participant will be able to:

-  Appreciate the importance of monitoring and evaluating IHR implementation
-  Apply theoretical monitoring and evaluation skills to implementation of IHR
-  Develop, implement, monitor, improve and evaluate monitoring and evaluation plans
-  Collect, analyze and disseminate information from various components of monitoring and evaluation framework
-  Use information from IHR monitoring and evaluations to advocate for resources.

-  WHO health emergencies staff
-  National public health institutes staff

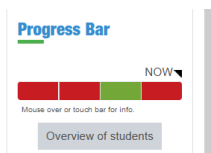

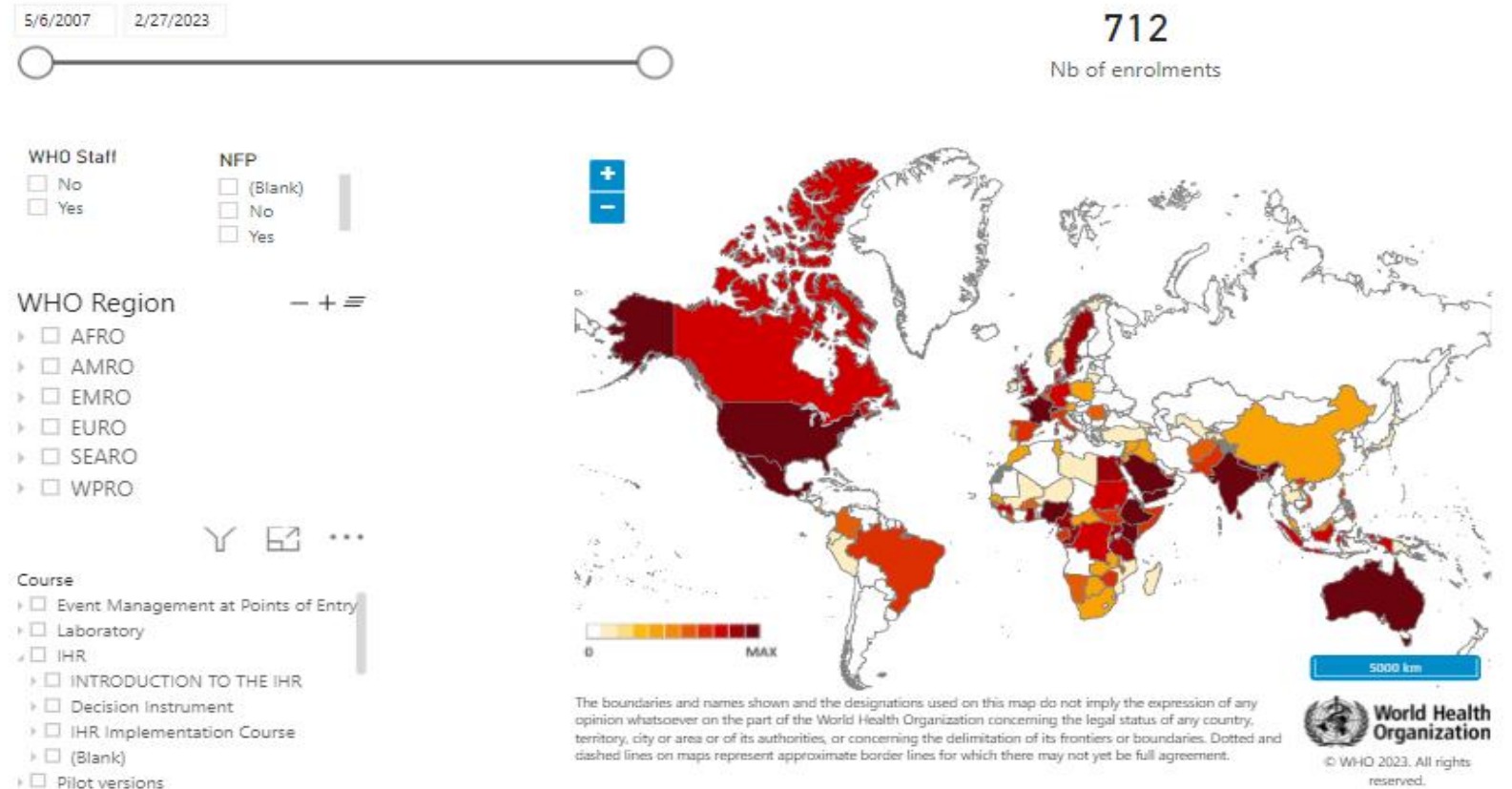

Enrolment until 2023

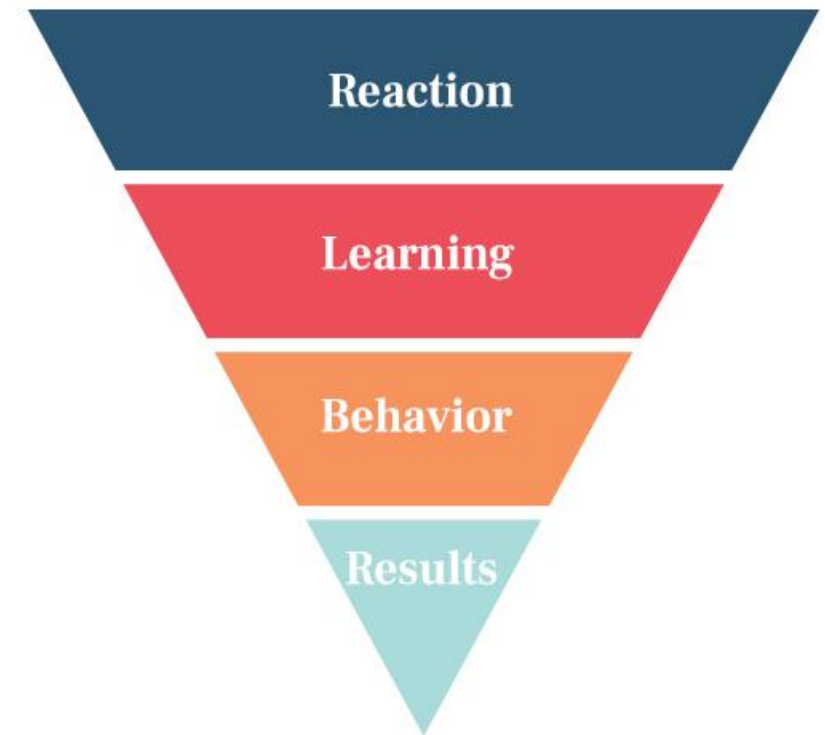
- All 6 WHO regions represented in the course

Outcomes and impact of this training is measured based on Kirkpatrick's evaluation model, more specifically through evaluation levels 3 and 4, as defined below:

- Level 3 evaluation (transfer) aims to respond to the question: Was the learning gained through the programme being applied by users/participants?).
- Level 4 evaluation (results) aims to respond to the question: What are the results of the training?

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Conclusion and recommendation

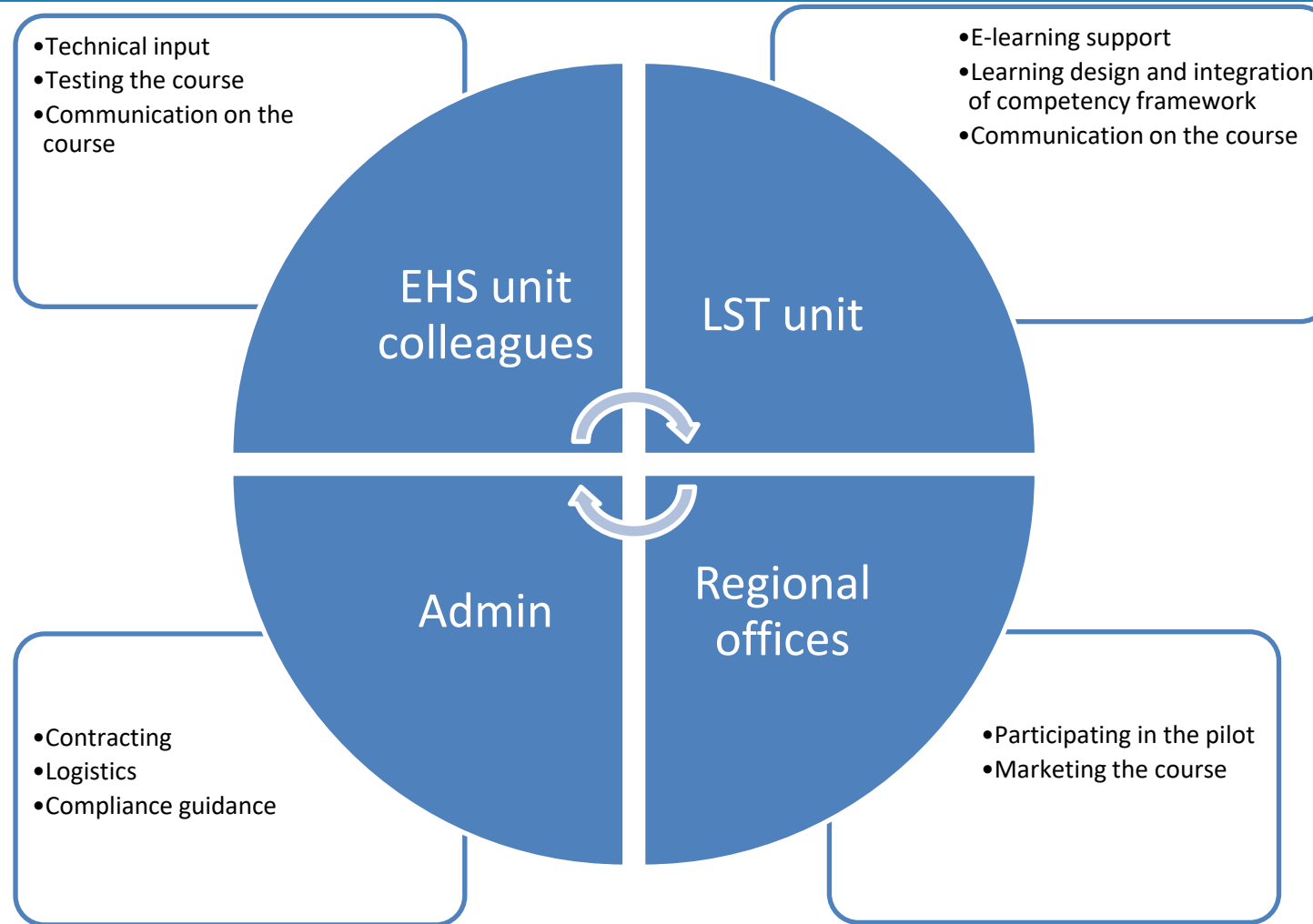
Overall aspects

- E-learning allowed for seamless, scalable and effective transfer of skills and competencies.
- One in-person training costed use as high as \$50k, which the cost of developing the entire online course
- Even with COVID-19 travel restrictions lifted, no in-person training is needed, only TOT training will be done in-person
- Learners found the course instantly applicable in management of COVID-19 based on learner testimonies during the post-completion webinar

Learning aspects

- Initial efforts for design and development of the course was intensive on both SME & Learning unit
- Online learning led to better tailoring the learning to participants & in integrating elements of IHR Competency Framework
- Visual tabs like progress bar and levels showed individual learners' progress and helped in personalized follow-up/feedback from learning unit & SMEs
- Peer-to-peer learning space within the course encouraged participants in submitting individual & group exercises
- Course being adapted to mobile/tablet learning as well has shown more intensive connections
